privately-owned wildlife restoration project. The list of wildlife returned there includes tomtit, whitehead, rifleman, robin, North Island brown kiwi, pateke, grey faced petrel, banded rail, Cook's petrel, diving petrel, tuatara, kakariki, takahê, kâkâ and giant weta.

The Cape to City project in the Tukituk River catchment aims to spread the sanctuary's biodiversity gains Havelock North's way. "When we built the predator proof fence around the Cape Sanctuary we saw it as a temporary measure. Not having to replace it in 40 years would be a definition of real success."
