SPOTLESS CRAKE Porzana tabuensis plumbea

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The Māori name for Spotless Crake is Puweto. Spotless crake are more often heard than seen and have a wide variety of calls which are usually heard at dawn and dusk. There are sharp 'pit–pit' calls, a single or repeated 'book' and a distinctive rolling 'purr' call.



Description

The head and underside are dark blue with a brown topside earning its 'spotless' name. Their short bill is black and they have a distinctive red eye and eye ring with reddish legs.

Food

The spotless crake eats worms, snails, spiders, tadpoles, insect larvae and seeds of aquatic plants and fallen fruits.

Breeding

Breeding is from August to February. Nests are composed of grasses and sedges within dense vegetated cover. A clutch of 2-4 eggs is incubated for 20-22 days by both parents. The black downy chicks are looked after until they reach an adult size at 4 - 5 months old.
